And just like the "pickers and grinners" of old Hee-Haw fame, this group was out in a country cornfield.

It's not any old cornfield – it's a field of sweet corn that is grown specifically for the youth at First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Dexter.

The corn is grown by church ember Jimmy Putnam for the youth – who pick and sell the sweet corn as an annual summer fund raising project.

Youth leader Tim Holder said the picking crew was larger than he had anticipated Thursday morning – with some high school athletes joining the picking crew after finishing their morning workout in the weight room.

"We picked for two hours," Holder said. The heat was getting intense by 9:30 a.m., the trailer was full of sweet corn, and the "pickers and grinners" headed back to town.

The youth are now selling the

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corner at the corner of Mulberry and Stoddard streets on the Cleo's Sinclair station lot. Sweet corn is \$4 a dozen while it lasts. Holder says the youth will pick Thursday night

one last time for Friday's stand.


The youth will use the proceeds of their sweet corn stand for on-going youth activities at the church and for sponsorship of a child in India through the denomination's mission outreach.

Dexter Cheer Squad Wins Regionals

For the first time in many years the DHS Competition Cheer Squad won first place at Missouri Cheerleading Coaches Association Southeast Regional competition, earning the opportunity to go on to state competition this fall. The regional competition was held Monday, July 18 at Perryville.

"They were shocked," said Coach Michelle Kirkley. Kirkley and Laura Stone are coaches for the squad. "We've never gotten first place at regionals, so the girls were shocked when the announcement was made. They just looked at each other for a moment before it all soaked in! Competition classes are based on a school's basketball classification, plus the number of squad members, said Kirkley. So the Dexter squad was Class 4-Small. Squads that include up to 14 members are classified Small; more than 14 Large.

"It's a small division, but it's a strong division," Kirkley said.

The Dexter girls were head-to-head against Festus and Perryville squads to win the regional competition. Other area schools competition at the regional competition include Sikeston, Holcomb, Cooter, Jackson, Park Hills, Kelley, Van Buren and Southland.

Judges have a number of criteria to consider in rating a performance. Included are crowd appeal, showmanship, skills with jumps, stunts, motions and tumbling, cheer execution, overall effectiveness and incorporation of music.

Latonka Programs To Resume August 1

A favorite spot in Southeast Missouri for many girls and generations of women will open its gates once again this summer.

Activities at the Latonka Program Center (known to many as Girl Scout Camp Latonka) will resume on Aug. 1. The Girl Scouts of the Missouri Heartland announced Monday that while events were "temporarily suspended" due to the aftermath of this spring's historic flood, the camp will open its gates next month.

"Activities had been suspended during the restoration process from the historic flooding that affected the Lake Wappapello area in May. All facilities at the program center – including the waterfront, challenge course and camping units - will be available to Girl Scout groups and community groups," the statement said.

To help get the facility "back into shape," a special clean-up day is planned for Saturday,

Aug. 13. Among the "chores" that need to be completed include raking leaves, clearing trails, cleaning cabins and shower houses and other tasks around the property. Volunteers, girl and adults members who would like to participate are invited to become involved in the effort.

The Latonka Program Center Clean-Up Day will begin at 9 a.m. Aug. 13.

Volunteers may want to bring work gloves and tools such as rakes and pruning shears if they have them.

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Volunteers may bring a picnic lunch to enjoy after the clean up is finished and Girl Scouts of Missouri Heartland will provide beverages, watermelon and ice cream for dessert. It is stressed registration is required for the clean-up day so that the council can anticipate the number of people participating.

In addition, adults will need to attend with girls in order to provide adult supervision.

Girl Scout Camp Latonka is celebrating its 60th anniversary this summer. The gates at the camp were opened for the first time to greet girls in July 1951.

Girl Scouts of Missouri Heartland was created in through the merger of Cotton Boll and four other Missouri Girl Scout Councils. The new council includes all of the former Cotton Boll area, and stretches to the Oklahoma and Kansas borders and north past Columbia and Fulton. Its headquarters is in Springfield, with service centers in Dexter, Joplin, Jefferson City and Cape Girardeau.
