22 "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy,© your whole body will be full of light. 23 But if your eyes are unhealthy,[d] your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness! 24 "No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money.

33 But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

1. What makes the eyes the most powerful part of the human body?


2. What can we do in this family to establish an environment for good eyes and good minds?



As I walked in the door to wish her Happy Birthday, she was nibbling on some chocolate birthday cake. Her eyes caught me as I entered the room and she never looked away until I knelt down by her side.

"Joe Boy," she said sincerely, "take me fishing." (Only Pardner called me Joe Boy!).
