MSHSAA Playoff Football Comes To Dexter

Charles Bland Stadium will host the Bearcats first matchup of the 2011 MSHSAA Playoffs on Wednesday night, when the 'Cats face off against Park Hills Central.

This will be the second time the two squads have met this season - the District 1 Champion Bearcats and District 2 runner-up Rebels faced off in the second week of the season, with the 'Cats coming out on top with a 37-27 final score.

Coach Pixley noted the advantages of already having faced the Rebels, but again pointed out their poignant power running game as a key concern for his defense.

"Anytime you play someone twice, you get a pretty good idea of what they're going to do - it doesn't mean you're going to be able to stop it," Pixley said. "We have the same concerns going in to this game that we had going into the game earlier in the year. They're a very good football team."

"They have a very good power running game, and they have a very good play action game on offense," he continued. "On defense, they play hard and get off the ball, they swarm to the ball very well. They haven't changed any since week two."

"You've gotta get prepared, you've gotta see it, you've gotta get out here and make sure

your mind is right and you know what's going on, and hopefully we'll be that way tomorrow night."

Quarterback Cody Stevens led the Bearcat offense against the Rebels in week two, with 64 and a TD on the ground, and 132 yards and 4 TD's through the air. Josh Overall nearly broke the 100 yard mark in the contest, racking up 96 yards on 13 carries. The duo will both have to have another big game for the Bearcats to be able to knock off the Rebels for the second time in 2011.

Defensively, Alex Cliff led the Bearcat 'D' with 13 tackles in the week two matchup. The Bearcats also won the turnover battle, 3-1, in the contest.

"Nothing has changed - we thought they were very good the first time around," Pixley said. The only difference is it's not 100 degrees outside like it was the first time around. I think both teams are in better shape, but we're going to have to play hard and physical football to beat these guys."

There will be a change of scenery for the Bearcats during the game: according to a MSHSAA rule, if the field doesn't have separate 'visitor' stands, the opposing team gets the choice of which sideline they will be on, and the Rebels have elected to be on the Bearcats' usual press box sideline.

Pixley addressed this is his post-practice speech with the team, but he said he didn't think it would be a factor for his team.

"If playing on the other sideline has an effect on us, then we have some major issues," Pixley said, laughing. "None of the little changes should make a difference."

"It's a state rule that if [your field doesn't] have visiting bleachers, the opposing team can pick the side they want to go on, and they said they wanted our side," he continued. "We go to the other side - that's just part of it. We're going to deal with it and not make an issue out of it." The Bearcats, luckily, haven't been hit hard by the injury bug this season. Players have missed a game here and there, but there hasn't been anything that kept any Bearcat out more than a game, save Dalton Putnam in the last three games of the season. The senior defensive back/wideout went down with an ankle injury - later reported as a high ankle sprain - during the Caruthersville game, and hasn't seen any action sense.

"Dalton's day to day - he hasn't practiced, but he's been out running and rehabbing that ankle, so we'll see how he's doing tomorrow before we make a definite decision," Pixley said of Putnam. "If not tomorrow, hopefully if we win the game tomorrow, we'll have him back for the next one."

Other than Putnam, the 'Cats are nearly at 100% for the State Playoff matchup against Park Hills. Zach Lacy is nursing a lower back injury, while RB/MLB Nick Summers is 'a little banged up', according to Coach Pixley. Despite their bumps, both seniors are expected to be in the starting lineup and playing at full capacity.

The contest is scheduled to get underway with a 7:00 p.m. kickoff. The cost of admission is \$5.00 for anyone ages 6 and up. No passes are accepted (MSTA, student activity, Gold Card, etc.) once teams enter into the state playoff rounds, per MSHSAA regulations.





Mason Has Solid Performance For Seckman

Mason Has Solid Performance For Seckman

If you saw any of the Mason children today, chances are you wouldn't recognize them.

When the family moved to the St. Louis area in the fall of 2007, Jackson was in fifth grade; Mabree was in third grade; and Davis was in kindergarden.

Chris and Janet, on the other hand, haven't changed a bit. Chris, the former music minister at FBC Dexter is now the worship pastor of First Baptist Arnold, in Arnold, Mo.

Janet is now the music teacher at Fox Elementary school.

Last Saturday, Jackson's freshman football team - the Seckman Jaguars - took on the Poplar Bluff Mules in their season finale. The oldest Mason child is slowly becoming both a young man and an outstanding football player.

The Jackson many of you remember is gone, his small stature replaced by a 6' 3", 200 pound frame. He is now a tight end, occasionally moving out to the slot, and is also a defensive end.

The Jaguars opened up Saturday's contest with a bang, picking off Poplar Bluff's quarterback on the first play of the game. Seckman has a potent rushing attack, led by Cole Luaders, who had three touchdowns and over 100 yards on the ground in the contest. Luaders - a great soccer player - also handles kickoff duties for the team, and had several kicks called for touchbacks during the game.

Seckman's defense was dominant throughout the first half, forcing three turnovers and not giving up any points.

"We've forced a lot of turnovers in the rest of our games," Mason said. "We average around two, maybe two and a half per game."

plays offense, and he is an exceptional blocker. On Luader's third touchdown of the game, a 50 yard scamper to the end zone, Mason had a monster block on a Poplar Bluff linebacker that made the play possible. His aggressive style punished Poplar Bluff defenders all game long.

He also runs crisp, precise routes in the passing game, and shows great finesse when catching the ball. The young squad doesn't throw the ball a lot, but when you see a ball go Mason's way, you can be sure it's going to be caught.

His only catch of the day came on a 3rd & 3 at midfield. The Jag's were driving down the field, but needed a big play to keep the drive alive. Mason ran a crossing route, just behind the PB Linebackers. The throw was a tad high, but Mason left his feet to haul in the ball and move forward for a 10 yard gain and a first down.

"I've had enough [catches] for my first year," he said. "I think we're going to start

throwing more next year once we grow as a team, and our quarterback develops his arm more."

The Jaguars would go on to blow out the Mules with a 28-8 final score, and improve their record to 6-2 on the season.

Seckman's only two losses on the year came from perennial football powerhouse Webster Groves and Kirkwood, a game that many feel the Jag's could have won.

Mason was pretty happy with his team's performance in their final game of the 2011 season.

"The first quarter, we came out and drove the ball right down their throats. We kept running outside and picking them apart that way," he said after the game. "We couldn't really run up the middle on them, so we kept it all off-tackle. Defensively, we had that interception the first play of the game, took that down and scored pretty quick. It was 20-0 before you really knew it."

Despite his success on the offensive side of the ball, Jackson has seen limited playing time on defense this season. He expressed a strong desire to be able to play more defensively next season.

"I wish I could get more in on defense - I like hitting kids," Mason said, laughing. "The blocking is all good and everything, you get to put people on their backs a couple times, but I like defense better - it's more physical."

Most kids would be sad that the football season was ending, but not Mason: he's going to be a three-sport athlete this year. Jackson will begin wrestling practice in a few short weeks, and both he and his father Chris mentioned him playing lacrosse in the spring, as well.


Jackson reflected his attitude towards defense when he was asked about why he wanted to play lacrosse - the sheer physicality of the game.

"I want to play lacrosse in the spring," he said with a look of sheer intensity. "It's obvious

- I get to hit people!"
