
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# **DHS Holds Mock Election**

Alana also explained that politicians are required to stay back 50 feet from the polling

place because in the past people might feel intimidated or pressured into voting one way or another.

This is a very important exercise that will teach these students about the process and the importance of voting, to the future of our country.
